This priority was focused on students being engaged and connected to learning through the Cycle of Inquiry. Classrooms showcase the student's learning with Learning Journey displays.

- 1. 100% of classroom teachers collaboratively planned and used the Trevallyn Curriculum Maps.
- 2. 100% of classrooms use language of learning using Learner Assets.
- 3. Most Teachers identified the Trevallyn Instructional Model supports the delivery of Inquiry.
- 4. Most teachers identified they planned and implemented at least 2 moderations sessions each for Science and HASS.
- 5. Most Teachers agreed that the collaborative planning focus in our Staff and Team Meeting roster provided opportunities to deepen their understandings of implementing Inquiry.

Priorities for 2025

- 1. General theme is to stay with this focus revisit the inquiry cycle, ensure all teachers are using the learner assets and split screens within their classrooms and support the links between Teaching with Intent and Inquiry.
- 2. Review and refine the Trevallyn Curriculum and Assessment Maps so that all teachers use as a practical guide for delivering the Australian Curriculum.
- 3. Continue to map out the staff meeting schedule/professional learning to space out our priorities during each term and connect professional learning teams to the implementation of this work.
- 4. To review and refine collection of evidence where, when and what it might look like? how do we use this to communicate learning to our students and parents? and how does this inform regular adjustments in our teaching?

Priority 2 - Focus - Improving Literacy, all students known and learning

Good Readers to Great Writers through rich literature

This priority is focused on DECYP Lifting Literacy. Students develop deep connection to learning through being effective communicators and make stronger connections between reading and writing.

2024 Strengths:

- 1. Many teachers identified they are implementing the Big 6 using the Trevallyn Explicit Instructional Model.
- 2. Some teachers identified they are using split screens for all literacy (both reading and writing) lessons.
- 3. 60% (some) of teachers identified their PLT met at least 5X a term.
- 4. Many teachers identified they brought student learning and assessments to support planning in their PLT.

The whole school approach to Positive Psychology Practices appears to have the biggest impact on School Climate, most significantly scoring below 10% low wellbeing in this area.

At this point in time every classroom teacher and permanent TA has been trained in the Berry Street Education Model with plans for all TAs and new teachers to complete initial training in 2025.

NB: All areas of wellbeing have shown positive gains using system quadrant (PowerBI) and all above 90% in med/ high wellbeing

HEALTHY HABITS WITH NURSE KYLIE



Healthy Habits with Nurse Kylie – SLEEP

March 14th 2025 was World Sleep Day, a day that encourages everyone to make their own sleep health a priority. Good sleep habits are often referred to as good sleep hygiene.

Why is sleep so important? Sleep is vital for children's wellbeing. Sleep supports healthy development of body and mind and evidence shows that those children who do not get enough sleep have trouble learning. In Australia, the number of children who are sleep-deprived is rapidly growing due to our lifestyle behaviours.

How much sleep do children need? Just like adults, each child is different in terms of how much sleep they need. The amount of sleep needed also changes as they age.

Children aged 6-13 years should ideally be sleeping for 9-11 hours, although anywhere from 7-12 hours may be appropriate for some children.

Teenagers aged 14-17 years should ideally be sleeping for 8-10 hours, although anywhere from 7-11 hours may be appropriate for some teenagers.

Here are 10 tips to help for a better nights sleep.

- Set up a bedtime routine A regular bedtime routine starting around the same time each night encourages good sleep patterns.
- **Relax before bedtime** Encourage your child to relax before bedtime. Older children might like to wind down by reading a book, listening to gentle music or practicing breathing for relaxation.
- **Keep regular sleep and wake times** Keep your child's bedtimes and wake-up times within 1-2 hours of each other each day.
- **Keep older children's naps early and short** Most children stop napping at 3-5 years of age. Longer and later naps can make it harder for children to get to sleep at night.
- Make sure your child feels safe at night If your child feels scared about going to bed or being in the dark, you can praise and reward your child whenever they're brave. Avoiding scary TV shows, movies and computer games can help too.
- Check noise and light in your child's bedroom Check whether your child's bedroom is too light or noisy for sleep, blue light from televisions, computer screens, phones and tablets suppress melatonin levels and delays sleepiness.
- Avoid the clock If your child is checking the time often, encourage your child to move the clock or watch to a spot where they can't see it from bed.
- Eat the right amount at the right time Feeling hungry or too full before bed can make your child more alert or uncomfortable. In the morning, a healthy breakfast helps to kick-start your child's body clock at the right time.
- **Get plenty of natural light in the day** Encourage your child to get as much natural light as possible during the day, especially in the morning.

Avoid caffeine - Caffeine is in energy drinks, coffee, tea, chocolate and cola. Encourage your child to avoid these things in the late afternoon and evening.
